

PROPOSAL - TO CONTINUE AN APPROVED WILDLIFE TRADE OPERATION, FOR HARVESTING AND EXPORTING NATURALLY FALLEN (MOULTED) BIRD FEATHERS.

INDEX (Parts):

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1. INTRODUCTION:

The applicant, that has submitted this proposal - is: Mark's Products and Services and referred to hereinafter as MP&S.

The proprietor of MP&S has extensive knowledge in many bird species, with a specialty in Australian and Exotic Cockatoos, Parrots and Raptors.

In addition for a love and passion of the bird species, MP&S also has excellent knowledge in business operations, e-commerce, Australian law, animal conservation and in many other areas, which has been valuable to operate successfully and responsibly to date.

MP&S is licensed in New South Wales, where it's based and has been legally acquiring and supplying these protected feathers throughout Australia - since 2014. MP&S also has an existing approved Wildlife Trade Operation (small scale) and a CITES commercial export permit for all the Cockatoo, Parrot and Raptor species as in Part 6 of this proposal - and has been legally exporting feathers from these species overseas since July 2015.

2. LICENSING AND COMPLIANCE:

MP&S operates from New South Wales and holds a NSW Licence, which is provided to MP&S in accordance with the provisions of Part 2 of the Biodiversity Conservation Act 2016.

Prior to this new (2016) Act, since 2014 it was in accordance with Section 120 of the National Parks and Wildlife Act, 1974. **Species covered:** All protected (including endangered) Australian native bird species.

There is no licence required in NSW to harvest and sell feathers within Australia from exotic (non-native) CITES Appendix II or Appendix I listed bird species. Bird keepers in NSW are not required to have a licence for keeping and selling these exotic bird species. This also applies in most Australian States.

Feathers from protected Australian native bird species can be acquired from licensed bird keepers all over NSW by MP&S under this licence and also from licensed bird keepers in other Australian States via a separate interstate import/export permit or movement advice, where applicable.

Under the Biodiversity Act 2016 (2018 regulation) the State of Western Australia does not require any export permit or movement advice into NSW for naturally shed (moulted) bird feathers that are from the species listed in Part 6 of this proposal. Prior to this recent Act, MP&S did hold a multiple consignment interstate feather export permit, issued to MP&S by the Western Australian Department of Parks and Wildlife, in accordance with the Wildlife Conservation Act 1950, Regulation 18.

Under regulations 53 and 54 (Victorian Wildlife Regulations 2013) the State of Victoria does not require any export permit or movement advice into NSW for naturally shed (moulted) bird feathers that are from the species listed in Part 6 of this proposal.

Under Schedule 1, Part 2, section 6(f) of the Wildlife Management Regulation 2006, the State of Queensland does not require any export permit or movement advice into New South Wales for naturally shed bird feathers which are from the species listed in Part 6 of this proposal, only if the species are legally kept in captivity and are not NCA or EPBC listed. If the feathers are from NCA or EPBC listed species then they can still be exported into New South Wales to MP&S with a movement advice, issued by the Queensland Department of Environment and Heritage Protection.

The State of South Australia allows the export of naturally shed feathers into New South Wales, from the species in Part 6 of this proposal, only if the species are legally kept in captivity. A movement advice may be required.

The feathers acquired by MP&S from bird-keepers within Australia become legally owned by MP&S before being supplied within Australia or exported overseas. MP&S only acquires feathers from licensed bird keepers (with the majority being large, reputable and well known bird breeders.)

All bird keepers supplying MP&S with feathers are aware that MP&S is licensed and operates strictly within Australian State and Federal Government laws and regulations. This is also why MP&S only appeals to (and trades with) reputable and law-abiding bird keepers.

3. HARVESTING METHODS:

Only feathers that have naturally fallen off the birds (from moulting) are harvested. The feathers are collected from inside the aviaries by the bird keepers, within their property and sent to (or collected by) MP&S. These feathers are purchased from the bird keepers by MP&S, as they do dedicate their time to collect the feathers from inside the aviaries. This is the only harvesting method used for all the bird species held by private bird keepers and wildlife parks. For the bird species in Part 6 of this proposal held by licensed bird carers and rehabilitators, the feathers are harvested using exactly the same method as used by the other types of suppliers (as above) at most times, but occasionally may include a different harvesting method that's also humane and legal.

4. SEASON AND GEOGRAPHIC LOCATION OF HARVEST:

Feathers can be harvested at any time of the year since they are not always collected immediately after they fall from the birds, but the majority of harvesting will take place during the moulting season and after the birds finish moulting - which is in the warmer months. In Australia it's usually between October and February - and this is the period the birds usually shed the most feathers.

The feathers are only sourced from New South Wales, Victoria, Queensland, Western Australia and South Australia.

5. ANNUAL HARVESTING QUOTA:

There is no annual quota, due to the nature of the harvesting method.

6. BIRD SPECIES:

The feathers legally and humanely harvested in Australia by MP&S, for the purpose of exporting overseas are all (except for six species) from CITES Appendix II listed bird species and none of these species are EPBC listed. The six bird species that aren't CITES listed are protected Australian native species. These particular species are highlighted in a **bold, blue** text. See table below:

7. FEATHER TREATMENT:

Before any feathers are sold to any customer they are washed at the MP&S facility, using hot water and a non-flammable specific chemical agent - which also removes faecal matter. The process is done in several stages, which ensures the feathers are thoroughly cleaned and rinsed. This cleaning technique will also remove any mites (if present) and their eggs (if present). Proper cleaning will ensure that the feathers are compliant to clear quarantine in most (and most likely all) countries. This also allows MP&S to declare the feathers as washed / treated when exporting.

8. TARGET MARKET:

MP&S sells feathers via it's website and online store, using a state-of-the-art order processing technology and invoice management system. Customers of MP&S benefit from these feathers, since many of these feathers have unique colourings and properties in them that makes them useful and on demand by many foreigners - for use in fly-tying, crafts, art, education, ceremonies and medicinal purposes.

People looking for such feathers, via internet search will find the MP&S website via exact matched keywords. The website targets only people looking to buy feathers from the species as listed in Part 6 of this proposal. Anyone looking for the feathers of such species does already know they exist and is looking for a place to buy them.

9. IMPACT ON THE SPECIES:

There is no negative impact on the bird species, whether in captivity or in the wild. This is because the feathers are only harvested humanely from legally held captive birds. If these feathers were not acquired from the bird keepers by MP&S they will remain in the aviary to be eaten/chewed by pests or thrown out in the rubbish. For the nicer feathers, possibly inside a vase of the bird keeper's house or given away by the bird keeper to people that visit them. If these feathers were collected from the wild then there can be an argument for causing some small negative impact to wild populations of other bird species and animals, since in the wild some birds and animals use the fallen feathers for nest building.

Due to the fact that there is absolutely no impact on birds and other animals in the wild or in captivity, then no study or scientific research report is required.

10. CONSERVATION BENEFITS:

By MP&S exporting overseas the naturally fallen (moulted) feathers does benefit conservation of all CITES listed bird species, but especially Australian native bird species - as listed in Part 6 of this proposal.

Australian bird feathers are currently (and well before MP&S existed) being illegally exported from Australia by other entities and then traded overseas, with no control by authorities in other countries since the protection status of Australian birds (and their parts, such as feathers) doesn't apply overseas like it does in their native country, Australia.

MP&S will continue to have an impact in reducing the illegal exporting of feathers from protected Australian birds, by making these feathers available overseas to the people that need them, legally, at lower prices and with documentation.

In the best interest of conservation, MP&S has set a very high standard sourcing feathers from licensed bird keepers and supplying them to people in Australia and in other countries. MP&S encourages other traders of such feathers to apply the same high standard.

11. CONFIDENTIAL SUPPLEMENT. PART 11 AND ALL ITS SECTIONS (A - G) ARE FOR YOUR DEPARTMENT'S INTERNAL VIEWING ONLY AND NOT FOR PUBLIC VIEWING.

In regards to this new Wildlife Trade Operation (WTO) proposal, only minor changes were needed (to update it) - so it's still very similar to the last proposal of the existing approved WTO. The main change is the updating of the Species & State Table (in Part 6) and the same updating of the more detailed Supplier Table (**Section G**, Part 11.)

Please Note:

Explanation about an: *alternative harvesting method (*to include feathers from deceased birds that are supplied to MP&S by approved licensed wildlife carers.)

The additional harvesting method, mentioned in Part 3 of this proposal is described as '**a different harvesting method that's also humane and legal**' for the purpose of publicly disclosing another harvesting method (other than naturally moulted feathers) while keeping this specific harvesting method unknown to the public, mainly due to the reason: That to provide this information on the WTO proposal in a way that won't affect the reputation of my business would also mean I would have to give away too much information, that could also give away the identity of my supplier (without even mentioning their name.) It's also a minority method of feather harvesting that may not end up happening - but if it does, I believe it's scientifically equally humane as harvesting naturally moulted feathers when done so legally in Australia.

The method to be used by MP&S for selling / supplying feathers which came from deceased bird species is explained in **Section E** (Part 11.)

A. ABOUT EAGLES HERITAGE:

Philip Pain is the director/owner of Eagles Heritage and is well involved and known with his conservation work concerning Australian Raptor species.

Philip shares my view, that by MP&S supplying Raptor feathers legally and in a responsible way to people that need these feathers can be beneficial for conservation of the species - by preventing these people from buying feathers from the same species illegally elsewhere as well as deterring illegal feather traders from acquiring and selling these feathers. He agreed to supply my business only on the condition that the feathers he supplies are sold responsibly and legally by MP&S. Philip has always been satisfied with how MP&S operates and plans on continually supplying my business whenever the feathers become available.

The income that Eagles Heritage receives from the feathers supplied to MP&S assists with the caring of the birds kept at Eagles Heritage.

Philip Pain supplied a letter to MP&S acknowledging being a supplier and the species that he has, had or may have in the future in his care. His license/s will cover all what he is doing and he is well known and respected by the Western Australian Department of Parks and Wildlife. Eagles Heritage is probably the largest Raptor conservatory in Australia.

Eagles Heritage keeps a large number of different Raptor species - used for public shows, rehabilitation and possibly for a breeding program. Philip doesn't always keep the same number of Raptors and other species due to his type of involvement. Some are rehabilitated and released back to the wild, some die, some might be transferred to another care facility and some may come into the care of Eagles Heritage from another facility and he would always receive a variety of injured bird species (from the wild) for rehabilitation.

This is a similar situation as with the private Parrot and Cockatoo keepers on my approved Wildlife Trade Operation (WTO), where the number of species held may fluctuate.

Eagles Heritage/Philip Pain may never send me feathers from deceased birds but this option is kept open, which is why it was included in his signed letter. Even if he was to include feathers from deceased birds in the future, I still expect the majority of the feathers he sends me to be naturally moulted feathers. The naturally moulted feathers will be harvested using exactly the same method as on my approved Wildlife Trade Operation.

B. HOW THE BIRDS BECOME DECEASED:

I: Injury; **II:** Natural Causes; **III:** Euthanized by a wildlife vet on compassionate grounds, due to a severe and/or unhealable injury or illness that's causing suffering to the animal. **Note:** 'I' & 'II' is a common sense cause of death, but 'III' is from my own knowledge as to what may also be a cause of death, so not from information supplied by Philip.

To date, there hasn't been any feathers from deceased birds supplied to MP&S by Eagles heritage - but it may happen in the future.

C. RECORD KEEPING:

To ensure a fail-proof and accurate record keeping system, the Grading Report that's always issued by email to every supplier (including Eagles Heritage) when feathers are received from them - details the feathers by **species**, ***type** (*i.e. tail, large/primary, medium/secondary, small), **grade/quality** and ****quantities** (**for each type of feather, from each species.)

Feathers from deceased birds (if ever received) will be itemized separately, so it's easy to differentiate between the naturally moulted feathers and feathers from deceased birds listed in the Grading Report.

D. STATE & FEDERAL DEPARTMENT LICENSING & REPORTING:

It is legal to import from WA into NSW naturally moulted feathers and feathers from deceased birds, as long as they were supplied to MP&S by a Licensed: Bird Keeper, Carer, Wildlife Park or a Zoo - whether the feathers came from protected birds that are either permanently or temporarily held. An interstate movement licence for feathers, whether naturally shed or from deceased birds (coming from WA into NSW) is no longer required, as was confirmed to me via email - by Mr. Norm Press (from Western Australian Department of Parks & Wildlife) on November 15, 2019.

Please note: Even though Western Australian laws now don't require any additional reporting procedure for feathers from deceased protected birds, MP&S will still itemize them separately. Your Department can still know how many feathers from deceased birds were received and exported. That's if it happens, as to date all feathers received from Eagles Heritage have been naturally shed.

When the Wildlife Trade Operation annual reporting is due, i.e. 'Stock Received & Export Statement' (SRES) for the exportable feathers received and sold from suppliers, then any feathers from deceased birds received and sold will also be itemized separately from the naturally moulted feathers. All the feathers received from suppliers in the annual SRES can be verified from the detailed Grading Report/s held by MP&S and issued to suppliers and all exported feathers in the annual SRES can also be verified from the export invoices issued to customers and from the CITES SER Acquittals. MP&S and Australian Border Protection (ABP) keep identical copies of all MP&S export invoices, as ABP require the invoice copy in order to issue an EDN (Export Declaration Number) which is also before the shipment is exported overseas to the customer. This is so the EDN can be printed on the SER before placing in the package with the feathers.

E. HOW THE FEATHERS WILL BE SOLD:

Naturally moulted feathers are all sold using the same method, as described in the WTO proposal. If feathers from deceased bird species are received in the future from Eagles Heritage then a different selling method will be used for these feathers, as explained below:

Unless advised otherwise by your Department, feathers from deceased Australian bird species supplied by Eagles Heritage will be sold by MP&S discreetly only. They will be available to specific customers that have no objection in using feathers removed from deceased birds, only which died from the causes as explained in **Section B** (Part 11) of this proposal.

These customers will of course be advised by MP&S about the harvesting method (i.e. from deceased birds) when offered to them, for ethical marketing purposes. Feathers from deceased birds will not be available for sale from the MP&S website and there will be no mention of these feathers on the MP&S website.

Some species, such as: Australian Raven, Bush stone-curlew, Laughing Kookaburra, Nankeen Night Heron, Tawny Frogmouth and Cockatiel - I couldn't find on the CITES Checklist. They aren't CITES listed but I would like to keep them on my WTO, in case I decide in the future to also obtain an Australian native export permit.

All these protected bird species on my WTO are not EPBC listed and all (except for the six Australian native species, as highlighted in blue text) are listed as CITES Appendix II.

The White Goshawk shares the same scientific name as the Grey Goshawk as they are the same species, only the white is a mutation of the Grey. This is why they are together in the table below.
