**Revocation of an Accreditation of a Plan, Regime or Policy for the Purposes of  
Part 13; *Acts Interpretation Act 1901* section 33(3); Accreditation of a Plan,  
Regime or Policy for the Purposes of Part 13**

I, NIGEL ROUTH, Assistant Secretary, Marine Biodiversity Policy Branch, as Delegate of the Minister for Sustainability, Environment, Water, Population and Communities, pursuant to sections 208A, 222A, 245 and 265 of the *Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999* (EPBC Act) and section 33(3) of the *Acts Interpretation Act 1901* revoke the accreditation dated 27 November 2005 for the Tasmanian Scallop Fishery.

Being satisfied that:

- the management regime for the Tasmanian Scallop Fishery, in force under the *Fisheries (Scallop) Rules 2005*, the Tasmanian Fisheries (General) Regulations 2000 and the Tasmanian *Living Marine Resources Management Act 1995*, requires persons engaged in fishing under the management plan to take all reasonable steps to ensure that members of listed threatened species, listed migratory species, cetaceans and listed marine species are not killed or injured as a result of the fishing; and
- the fishery to which the management plan relates is not likely to adversely affect:
  - the survival or recovery in nature of any listed threatened species; or
  - the conservation status of a listed migratory species, cetacean, or listed marine species or a population of that species,

I hereby accredit the *Fisheries (Scallop) Rules 2005*, the Tasmanian *Fisheries (General) Regulations 2000* and the Tasmanian *Living Marine Resources Management Act 1995*, to the extent that they apply to the Tasmanian Scallop Fishery, pursuant to sections 208A, 222A, 245 and 265 of the EPBC Act for the purposes of Divisions 1, 2, 3 and 4 respectively of Part 13 of the EPBC Act.
